### Explore these exciting options

**Monday –Electives** We start the week with chapel in the gym and then we immerse students in hands-on electives that foster critical thinking, creativity, and exploration. With over ten electives to choose from, students have the opportunity to pursue their passions developing new skills and gaining credit for high school electives.

**T-W-Th Core Academic Classes** – These core (English, History, Math, Science) academic days focus on deepening students' understanding of the core subjects. Our instructors bring lessons to life using engaging resources that encourage problem-solving and real-world application. Students actively collaborate, think critically, and participate in hands-on activities that make learning meaningful and dynamic. Students will rotate to specialty teachers for all core subjects.

## Scholarships Accepted:

**FES-EO, FTC, FES-UA Scholarships** – Require full-time, on-campus enrollment. Independent study time is provided for dual enrollment students.

**PEP Hybrid Private School Scholarship** – For students attending 2-4 days per week as part of Champion Preparatory Academy.

**PEP-Homeschool Academy** – For 1, 2, 3, 4-day-a-week online students or homeschoolers enrolled in Champion Academy.

## Two-Days A Week PEP Hybrid Program

High school—reimagined with flexibility and purpose. This two-day-a-week program offers the perfect balance of academics, enrichment, and community. Mondays feature enrichment and electives, while Thursdays are dedicated to academic support, community service, and connection. Seniors and Dual Enrollment students can use the PEP Hybrid Scholarship, eliminating out-of-pocket costs for senior year. Graduates earn an official CPA diploma.

## Dual Enrollment and High School Credits

Eligible Champion students may participate in dual enrollment opportunities through Valencia College, Seminole State College, and Lake-Sumter State College, as well as trade programs offered at Lake Technical College or Orange Technical College. Additional college options may be available—please consult with our guidance counselor, Ms. Silbernagel, for more information. She can also guide families on how approved hobbies or extracurricular activities may earn high school credit.

<b>Lunch:</b> Bring your own lunch & drink
<b>Dress Code:</b> Monday & Friday Modest Dress Code T-W-TH- Students need to order school logo shirts. (See Dress Code)
<b>Arrival Time:</b> Drop off at the gym from 8:45 until 9:30 AM. Students arriving after 9:00 AM are considered tardy. After 9:30, please drop off at the school office.
<b>Pick-up Time:</b> Students must be picked up by 3:15. After 3:15, a \$5.00 charge will be incurred for every 10 minutes late.
Grades 9-12 MONDAY CLASS DESCRIPTIONS
Monday is a day of enrichment and High School Electives. Please note all credit classes require assignments.
<b>Praise Team:</b> 8:00 AM-9:00 AM
<b>Chapel:</b> Grades 6-12 will come together for a time of prayer, pledge of allegiance to the flag, praise & worship.
<b>Math:</b> Day School students are required to attend Monday Algebra 1, Geometry or Algebra 2. Homeschool students can also sit in and get help with their questions.
<b>STEAM/Robotics:</b> (8600550) Hands-on Learning (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) Our STEAM LAB will excite and motivate children to love learning. Our lab building is fully equipped with the latest technology: Lego robots, Dot & Dash Robots, coding, 3D Printers, AR & AV Z Space computers, a green screen for Zoom or streaming projects, and new computers. While technology is an integral part of the lab experience, there are still many hands-on projects where we will set the technology aside. <b>Lab Fee: \$50.00</b>
<b>Yearbook (6-12):</b> (0108310) Students will assist with working on the layout and design of the school yearbook. Extra hours beyond class time may be required.
<b>Guitar Music Class:</b> Guitar 1 (1301320), Guitar 2 (1301330) Students will learn the fundamentals of guitar. <b>Additional book purchase required.</b>
<b>Mixed Media (6-12):</b> (0101300, 0101310, or 0101320) This is a foundational art course where students will discover various media like acrylic paint, watercolor, pastels, sculpture, and more.
<b>SAT Reading/Writing Process:</b> Intensive Reading 1, (1000412) (0.5 cr.), Writing 1, (1009300) (0.5 cr.) Preparation for the writing portion of the SAT and other possible college entrance writing needs.
<b>Student Success/Critical Thinking:</b> Critical Thinking Skills, (1700370) (0.5 cr.), Research 1, (1700300) (0.5 cr.) Students will develop skills in critical thinking, learning, and problem-solving that will enhance their performance in both academic and nonacademic areas.
<b>Ceramics:</b> Explore art through sculpture. Students will work on a variety of projects using clay.
<b>Biology Lab:</b> Based upon Day School Biology class. Recommended for Full Time Day School students taking the full course. Homeschool students will benefit from the class setting for lab projects too.
<b>Personal Finance Literacy (Year Long 0.5 credits):</b> (8500120) Students dive into the study of personal finance with an emphasis placed on economic decision making and real-life applications using real data.
<b>Art and Drawing:</b> This is a foundational art course where students will increase their skills using pencil and paper.
<b>Art with the Masters (6-12):</b> A tour through time with the Artistic Masters. From the Impressionists to Pop Art, discover various media like acrylic paint, watercolor, pastels, sculpture, and more...all while looking at famous works with a critical eye.
<b>HOPE:</b> (3026010) Health Opportunities through Physical Education. This class combines fundamentals of healthy living with staying healthy through physical education. This course is required for the 24 or 28 credit diplomas.
<b>Everyday Fitness:</b> Personal Fitness, (1501300) (0.5 cr.)/Fitness Lifestyle Design, (1501310) (0.5 cr.) Fitness is a lifelong journey built upon good decisions at every stage. In this class, students will learn how to make fitness manageable using common items found at home and will learn about making healthy choices and habits that will grow with them.
<b>Culinary Arts:</b> (8800510) Students will learn basic cooking and knife skills, nutrition, how to read and follow a recipe, measurements, safety, and sanitation. <b>Lab Fee: \$300.00</b>
<b>Acting and Scene Studies:</b> In the fall semester, students will focus on acting techniques and learn how to create believable characters on the stage. In the spring semester, students will enter scene study and apply techniques learned to monologues and 2 person scenes. <b>Parents are required to purchase the following book: Meisner for Teens: A Life of True Acting by Larry Silverberg.</b> Book is available on Amazon.
<b>Spanish 1 or 2 (8-12):</b> Spanish 1 (0708340), Spanish 2 (0708350) This class is a high school credit class and may be taken by students' 8 <sup>th</sup> grade and up. There is homework and students will need access to Apex curriculum. If a student isn't taking T-W-TH

<p>classes, they will need to purchase Apex for a lab fee of \$250.00. High School Students M-Th students will have access to Spanish without any further fees.</p>
<p><b>Stock Market Simulation/Personal Finance:</b> (2102371) (0.5 cr.) Students participate in a hands-on experience where they buy and sell virtual stocks, learning the basics of investing and market dynamics. This engaging environment fosters financial literacy, teamwork, and critical thinking skills as students compete in simulated trading challenges.</p>
<p><b>Speech/Creative Writing: Speech</b> (1007300) (0.5 cr.) Students will learn the basics of speaking, and how to give persuasive, motivational and entertaining speeches. <b>Creative Writing</b> (1009320) (0.5cr.) Students will increase their writing skills and creative written expression.</p>
<p><b>Technical and Performance Theater (6-12):</b> (0400310) For students interested in performing in theater, this class will hone their acting, dance, and speaking skills while working on a major production. The theater production will be held in May. For students interested in the technical aspects of theater, may choose to learn how to use the sound and lighting equipment instead of doing Theater. <b>Lab Fee: \$100.00</b></p>
<p><b>Technical (Elements of Sound and Lighting)</b> is now listed as separate class. They work together with Performance Theater class.</p>
<p><b>Digital Art/Photography:</b> (0108370) Explore the characteristics of digital art through digital drawing tools, painting programs, basic photography skills and photo editing, and graphic design platforms.</p>
<p><b>Outdoor PE/Sports:</b> Comprehensive Fitness, (1501390) (0.5 cr.)/Sports Ind. &amp; Dual Sports 1, (1502410) (0.5 cr.) Students will learn various outdoor sports and fitness exercises.</p>
<p><b>Newspaper/Journalism:</b> Students will create two editions of Champion Newspaper for students and families, one in December and one for May. <b>Lab fee of \$50</b></p>
<p><b>In Motion: Athlete Activation:</b> A high-energy morning class designed to wake up the body, prime the nervous system, and build athletic readiness for the day. Start your morning the way athletes start their training — with purposeful movement that builds speed, sharpens coordination, and boosts overall performance. This class blends dynamic warm-ups, speed-ladder work, mini-hurdle drills, calisthenics, and mobility to activate every major muscle group and fire up quick-reaction patterns.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Grades 9-12 TUESDAY, WEDNESDAY, AND THURSDAY INFORMATION</b></p>
<p>The focus on T-W-Th is core academics. All classes meet or exceed Florida Standards. Most academic work is accomplished during their time at school. Students will have some homework each evening such as reading, writing, math practice, and studying for quizzes and exams. Teachers use computers and other resources to enhance the curriculum and to provide engaging hands-on lessons that the students will enjoy. Grades 9-12 Students will use Positive Action for Bible and BJU curriculum for English and Social Students and Apex for Science and Math subjects. A laptop computer is required for grades 6 &amp; up. The computer must have a good battery and a quick processor to pull up information quickly. <b>Parents are required to pay Book Fees of \$300.00 which include Apex curriculum and **Parents Purchase BJU Books by July 31<sup>st</sup>. Please label all books with the student's name. Book lists and supply lists will be provided by July 1.</b></p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Grades 9-12 FRIDAY INFORMATION 9:00-12:00</b></p>
<p>Required for full-time M-F students. Friday is a day of school. If you are not signed up for the Friday on-campus program, the parent will need to supervise the student at home to make sure Friday assignments are completed and ready to turn in by Tuesday. Students in 9-12 should expect to have approximately two and a half hours of assignments on Friday. Friday classes provide teaching staff to help students complete their Friday assignments. Friday students may also attend school field trips instead of being in class. Students are required to complete Friday assignments at home if they attend a field trip. Parents transport and supervise students on field trips. Teachers do not attend field trips.</p>
